SENIOR TAX LEVIES IN MISSOURI - FREQUENTSLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. What is a senior levy?

A senior levy is a tax on taxable property, allowed by state law, to benefit older residents. Currently, 55 counties and St. Louis have a senior levy.

2. Where does the funding come from?

The funding comes from a property tax of five cents per \$100 of assessed value on both real and personal property.

3. How much does the tax cost?

For example, a taxpayer with a home valued at \$100,000 would pay \$9.50 annually in real property tax, and a taxpayer with a \$10,000-valued automobile would pay \$1.67 annually in personal property tax.

4. How much will be generated?

Consult with your county assessor to determine the assessed property value in each county.

5. How will the funds be used?

The funds will support services enabling individuals to age in place in your county. This includes services like home-delivered meals, senior center development, home-safety repair, and supports for daily living for older adults.

6. Who is eligible for funding?

Senior service providers for residents aged 60 and above in Jackson County are eligible.

7. Is it only for low-income individuals?

No, while some services are based on need, others will be available to all individuals aged 60 and older.

8. How is the funding distributed?

Each county will select an independent board to determine the allocation of the funds. All funds will stay in that county.

9. What happens if the Proposition doesn't pass?

If the Proposition doesn't pass, there will be funding gaps, resulting in a lack of services for seniors who require assistance to remain in their homes.

10. When will the services begin?

Services are expected to commence approximately 18 months after the ballot issue is passed.
